### Spider Infestation at PLG Summer Camp

From what I have heard, summer camp and spiders go hand-in-hand. So what better place to be during the week of July  $11^{\text{th}}$  than the PLG Lace Summer Camp at the Grace Reformed Presbyterian Church? This was the week when the group revisited our old friend, the Torchon lace spider. Using the book *A Study of Torchon Spiders*, by Julie Hendricks, seven brave souls studied different patterns for these many-legged motifs so dear to those who love Torchon.

Amy Gibbons served as the official spider wrangler by giving us written directions that set forth a different self-guided task for each day of the fourday camp. On Day One, we breezed through fourlegged spiders, forming four basic designs from the basic cloth stitch motif through the beading spider. Day Two saw the coming of the six-legged spider, and the pricking for that day included eight different spider designs ranging from the cloth stitch spider to the wide-eyed spider. On Day Three, we continued to work on our six-legged spiders, and Amy gave us more written directions for the next group of spiders-you guessed it-the eight-legged variety. On Day Four, we tackled the eight-legged spiders, for which we had an incredible thirteen different patterns. Always the leader, our intrepid

Amy even completed five ten-legged spider designs, for the future edification of anyone who is interested in any more arachnid-inspired lace.

Despite some tongue-in-cheek complaints about the amount of writing that this workshop required, the response was enthusiastic, with virtually all of the participants giving it ten out of ten stars. Some comments are as follows:

#### Passport to Tonder by Susan Hottle

I attended a Tonder workshop in Cortland, OH, on Sat. September 10<sup>th.</sup> Thanks to Denmark, we have a fine floral style lace in which there is great contrast between the point ground & the cloth stitch areas enclosed by gimp. Suggested threads are YLI 100, Egyptian cotton 120, Brok 140 or Finca 100 to be used with coton a broder 20 gimp. This difference in thread size is what helps make Tonder so distinctive. Other features that set this style apart are the 54 degree angle, Cumberland Edge, Copenhagen holes & gimp fingers. The order of work for this lace is by section or motif rather than row

Would you believe--eight lacemakers working with fine silk or cotton thread managed to make it through the day with no broken threads! Quite an accomplishment, I would say, as we worked our You have probably seen some beautiful bracelets and necklaces that Amy and Joanie have made using a six-inch Kumihimo braiding disk. I bought one of the disks and beads and fasteners. Linda printed out the directions. That will be <u>another</u> <u>project</u> for me, but I love to learn new techniques. This appears to be fairly easy and can be completed in a short time.

Esther met us at Your Beading Heart and Amy and I followed her to her home in Jeannette. Esther had prepared a delicious lunch for us, and Amy brought an elderberry pie. We had a nice visit and, as always, we never ran out of things to talk about.

way through our beginner or advanced patterns. The beginner pattern featured tallies & Copenhagen hole shamrock shapes surrounded by gimp. Beginner students were permitted to use bigger threads: YLI 50, Madeira 80, Finca 80 or Bockens The advanced pattern offered Copenhagen 120. holes, honeycomb fillings, tallies & gimp fingers. Both patterns had double picot 7+1 edges. Working point ground was a new experience for many of us. After having "close the pin" drilled into my brain, it took a little practice to CTTT, pin & go! At the end of the day we each received a copy of the Tonder Lace Festival 1995 edging pattern to try at home. According to their website www.kniplingsfestival.dk/, there will be another Tonder Lace Festival June 7-9 2013 so we've got time to practice.

From Pittsburgh: Parkway East (I-376) to Churchill Exit (Exit 10-A); right at bottom of ramp to "Y" intersection with Beulah Rd. (Rt. 130-W); take the right branch and immediately get into left lane. Turn left at the light (left turn signal) onto Old Wm. Penn Highway. Borough Bldg. is on the left, entrance to parking lot is just beyond the building. You may use either parking lot, but if you use the lower lot, please park away from the building so the police can park close to the building. Enter through the side doors.
