# **RECENT HAPPENINGS**

## HUNGARIAN TAPE LACE WITH LOUISE COLGAN – MAY 2018 By Sandy Faulk

During May 4 -7 members from the group met at the Churchill Borough Building to attend a workshop led by Louise Colgan. Attendees were asked to select from four patterns offered to explore the techniques of Hungarian tape lace. One of the goals of this workshop was to show us how to make elaborate pieces using a few bobbins. All the patterns used seven to nine pairs. Designs made use of multiple sewings and plaited



fillings to fill open spaces. The actual tape width was expanded or condensed by using cloth stitch, half and whole stitch. We were also introduced to pivot and tight-point turns. The goal of the workshop was to introduce basic Hungarian designs so that we might explore them further on our own. Louise is such an accomplished and knowledgeable lacemaker that it was a joy to take her class.

The main drama for the workshop (actually, THE running story line for the workshop) was the fact that Theresa couldn't find her car keys after she arrived at the borough building on Saturday. The long and the short of the story is that finally on Sunday, she found them in the trunk of her car. Her car did spend a little extra time at the borough parking lot. Whew!

Unfortunate news was Cynthia signed up for the class but couldn't come at the last minute because her cat fell out of a window at her home and it took several days to retrieve the cat. We missed having Cynthia with us.

#### UPCOMING EVENTS: SUMMER CAMP CHURCHILL BOROUGH BUILDING AUGUST 21-24, 2018

Surprise! This year, instead of starting on Monday, we are starting on Tuesday due to scheduling constraints at the Churchill Borough Building. Summer Camp will begin about 7 and go until 9. I have found three projects; two involve Christmas trees, with one of the trees and a bell inside a bangle. You will have fairly easy options to choose from. The bangles uses four or more pairs of size 30 thread, but I think you could substitute tatting cotton (you might need more pairs, but would have a better color selection). The tree requires eight 4mm beads and 10 spacer beads plus some kind of star for the top. I think you could pick any beads you want. The bell pattern uses white thread with 3 beads and some strung together to make a clapper. The card is a fairly free-form tree that can be made in varying weights of metallic threads, although nothing too fine. It also uses various beads in different shapes and sizes that would give the impression of ornaments. See the pictures below. The group's metallic threads and winder will be available. Card stock and bangles will be provided. This is always a bunch of fun for us. Nothing is very complicated, but you should be able to complete one project, if not two or three.

Maria, who is a vendor extraordinaire, will have things for sale and will do a brief talk beginning at 8:00. There is an admission charge of \$5.00 and you are asked to bring snacks or desserts that are finger foods. Coffee and tea will be provided.

On Saturday we will begin making some Schneeberger projects. Hours will be 10:00 to 5:00 on Saturday and 9:00 to 4:00 on Sunday. We will go out to dinner with Maria on Saturday night. ## **BOOK REVIEWS: SCHNEEBERGER LACE**

The Pittsburgh Lace Group's library has three books featuring Schneeberger Lace.

Lia Baumeister-Jonker's *Schneeberger Lace* is a good place to start. Self-published in 1983, it's a nice step by step introduction into this technique. The author presents six lessons with clear instructions and drawings explaining the moves. Lesson 1 is a simple edging with seven pairs and includes basic set-up instructions. She provides very clear instruction on how to make a picot. The following five lessons quickly change to patterns with more design and substance. Each technique is shown in detail with multiple drawings. Prickings, to be used for each lesson, are found at the back of the booklet. Finally, each pattern is shown completed in a black and white photo. It's a low-tech book but has a wealth of information in techniques.

The second book for review is Brigitte Bellon's Schneeberger Klöppelmotive

(collaborated with Barbara Fay Verlag). Published in 2008, this book is still available to purchase. ISBN 978-3-925184-50-5. This book is in German and English. Prickings are for as few as four pairs, and many of them work in sections. Complete section A, tie off and add new bobbins for section B, etc. The result is some very lovely pieces which look complicated but are really pretty reasonable to make. The nice thing about this book is that there are some small patterns which quickly set up and can be completed with little time. The bell pattern shown here uses eight pairs and has two sections. I completed it in two and a half

evenings; it would make a nice Christmas ornament. This book has lots of prickings and instructions with drawings are included whereever a unique technique is introduced.

The third book available in our library is Lia Baumeister-Jonker's <u>Schneeberger</u> <u>Lace Patterns</u>. I was unable to check out this book in time for a review.
