# **DEWI WONG: Her Immigration Story and a Background on Chinese Knotting**By Joan Trimble

On Wednesday, April 11, 2022, our member Dewi Wong was the featured presenter of a Zoom session sponsored by Jewish Family and Community Services of Pittsburgh. The hourlong presentation featured Dewi sharing her history of immigrating to Pittsburgh and chronicled her lifelong love of needlework, with an emphasis on Chinese Knotting. Several members of the PLG joined the presentation and asked great questions about Chinese Knotting.

Dewi, who was born in Indonesia, shared some lovely vintage pictures of her family, dating all the way to her paternal and maternal great-grandfathers. Coming from a line of seamstresses and needle workers, Dewi described being the youngest child of the family, and learning crochet and other needlecrafts at her mother's knee, starting when she was only five years old. This early experience ignited in her a passion for all things made by hand, and spurred her to become the amazing fiber artist that we know her to be. I was impressed by her statement that all artists use tools, but the most amazing tools that any crafter or knotter has are their hands.

Arriving in Pittsburgh in the 1970s, Dewi earned a master's degree in architecture from Carnegie-Mellon University. She met her husband Karl here, and is the mother of two, as well as the grandmother of a lovely little girl. Dewi worked in the Planning and Construction division of the Facilities Management Department of the University of Pittsburgh, from which she is retired. She is a member of the Fiberarts

Guild of Pittsburgh, as well as the PLG. Her various works, in varied techniques, have been featured not only locally, but in juried shows as far away as Australia. She showed the Zoom participants wearable knotted pieces and a photograph of two of her lace artworks that are showcased at the Pittsburgh Airport as part of the Common Threads Exhibit sponsored by the Fiberarts Guild.

Dewi modeled her wearable shawl, "Catch of the Day," which features a lace background highlighted by several Chinese knotted sea creatures. I haven't described it well, but it is certainly lovely and unique. She also shared some of her knotted creations with us, stressing the importance of passing the technique onto future generations so that the skills stay alive.

Towards the end of her presentation, Dewi demonstrated the technique for completing a basic Chinese knot. Her dexterous hands flew through the procedure, which I have seen several times, but which always amazes me. I am totally in awe of her skill! She graciously repeated the steps several times, and then showed how even the basic knot can be used as an elegant accent or as a component in a piece of jewelry or a home-décor item.

Many thanks to Dewi for sharing this beautiful technique and her exquisite creations with us!

# EXHIBIT: "A LEGACY OF LACE" -- Lacers of the Lake at Trumbull Art Gallery, Warren OH By Nancy Wellington

Saturday, May 28, was a beautiful day, perfect for a road trip to Warren, Ohio for the "Legacy of Lace" exhibit put on by the Lacers of the Lake and a talk by Allie Marguccio, "Idrija Lace: Preserving a Family Tradition."

What a delight, when I got there, to find that Dewi was a member of that group and had contributed a lot to the exhibit! There were people there from Ohio, Pennsylvania, Michigan, and Minnesota (yours truly).

People walking by the Trumbull Art Gallery on the courthouse square would be first captivated by the knitted lace wedding dress, made by a member for her daughter, in the outside window. Inside, half of the gallery was dedicated to the "Legacy of Lace". As the photos show, visitors saw traditional bobbin lace in patterns from many different regions and in many styles, and also contemporary designs and interpretations, including pieces in knitted lace, crochet, tatting, needle lace, Armenian lace, Tenerife, netting, hairpin, macramé and hardanger. Pieces were identified by technique as well as by place of origin and style. Many pieces in the exhibit, both traditional and contemporary, had been made by the group's members, including Dewi.

Though I already knew Allie and her story, her presentation taught me much more about Idrija lace, as well as about her own lace story. Particularly striking to me was the photo of a painting in the Church of St. Ann in Cerkno, Slovenia (near Idrija), which shows St. Ann, mother of Mary, with a Slovenian lace pillow at her feet!

The exhibit continues through June 18. The lace is beautiful and interesting, and the exhibit itself is very well laid out. It's worth the trip!

#### **NEW BOOK REVIEWS**

Bucks Point Lace Workbook by Louise West gives basic techniques to lacemakers new to this lace. It assumes knowledge of equipment preparation and stitches. It then starts with the techniques peculiar to this traditional English lace. Each pattern adds another technique(s) for a total of 15 projects. The instructions and drawings are clear and large enough for those of us with aging eyes. This workbook is definitely one to have when doing any Bucks Point project.

The PLG library has added two more pamphlets by Claire Burkhard: *White Christmas* and *Multicoloured Bobbin Lace*. The former consists of patterns for stars, angels. and other "Christmasy" designs. The latter consists of colorful 3.5" squares to be used as coasters. The squares could be used as ornaments/decorations on clothing, bags, trees, etc. As always, the instructions are minimal, but the prickings are clear and easy to follow.

Gekloppelte Kloppel by Barbara Corbet is a tour de force. It has 34 patterns from 15 European countries, as well as the various bobbins associated with the different lace styles. The shapes of the bobbins are incorporated into the pattern; for example: a pair of spangled bobbins in the Bedfordshire lace, hooded bobbins in the German Torchon and Maltese bobbins in their traditional lace. The patterns and photos are beautiful, large and clear. Definitely a book to savor.

As usual with a book written by Ulrike Voelcker, *Crossings* is packed with useful techniques and beautifully presented. She illustrates 2-8 pair crossings, as well as several specialized ones (windmill, Venetian plait). The line drawings of the crossings are in black and white and multicolored. The photos of the finished stitch are, too. After working through all the crossings(!), the lacemaker can go on to one of the star/snowflake prickings at the end of the book.

Pat Read and Lucy Kincaid's two classic books of Milanese braids have long been out of print. *Decorative Braids-Milanese Lace* by Read, Kincaid and Jane Read is a re-issue of the those braids plus nearly 50 not previously published. This is a reference book with step by step directions and the usual line drawings. Another useful lace book paid for by the "Thursday night can." as were all the others reviewed here.

#### SUMMER CAMP AUGUST 8 – 12, 2022
