Summer Camp ~August 10 through the 13th

Woo Hoo, here we go again. It is hard to believe that this is the sixth year we have gotten together to frolic for a week in the Summer. On Monday night we will begin with a brief meeting. The longer we run our mouths, the less time we will have to learn. During the four days we will be watching parts of Susan Wenzel, a.k.a. Lacy Susan, a.k.a. Fast Suzy 's DVD - "Starts and Finishes." We will work on three methods of starting a bookmark and three methods of finishing it. Fortunately the prickings can be shortened and turned into ornaments easily. If we are good we will do one method of starting the Monday. End that piece and begin a different one both Tuesday and Wednesday. Thursday night we will finish the last piece and have learned three different methods for both starting and finishing a bookmark. That means that you will have to struggle to work the middle and be ready to finish the previous night's piece every night. I have planned this torture so that you will remember what it is like to make lace at home. Be careful or you will be forced to make the lace blindfolded – just to prove you learned something last year.

Prickings will be available for a massive fee at the "Informal Class" July 16th.

WHAT YOU NEED for the first night

- 1. an empty pillow
- 2. pins.
- 3. scissors
- 4. the pattern which you picked up and pricked
- 5. Bobbins

For Monday, 14 pairs

For Tuesday 20 pairs plus one gimp.

For Wednesday 22 pairs

Unless we change our minds about which method To work first.

- 6. Thread Egyptian Cotton 36/2 The gimp is Perle cotton 5 (a copy of Patternoster is in the library.)
- 7. Paper and pencil to make notes so that you can check them later after you have forgotten exactly how to do what you learned in class.

Hopefully you will not be too bothered by whooping and hollering at the strippers, or the catcalls being made to the dancing boys. Bring your dollars for their G-strings.
